Helpful Village

Foggy Bottom West End Village will soon be moving from our current database and webpage to a new platform called Helpful Village (HV). Unlike our current platform which was created for use by any membership organization, HV was created from scratch specifically for villages.



The tech expert who started HV had begun to volunteer with the village his mother joined and soon discovered the shortcomings of

the database program that village (and many others) used. Thus, HV was started and is now one of the two predominate platforms used by villages across the country. Of the 13 villages in DC 11 are already using HV or are in the process of switching to it.

HV will make everything from registering for a program to volunteering in response to a request easier for members and volunteers. From an administrative perspective it will make compilation of statistics and data reporting much easier. There are many things that are done automatically in HV that staff must now do manually.

We will also change our website. We have rewritten all the wording to bring everything up to date and to eliminate duplication when unnecessary. The downside to the HV website structure is that it does not give many options for creativity which we may address next fiscal year.

There will be a handful of members who are tech-savvy as well as a group of members without tech skills who will help us test HV before it

goes live (or is made visible to the membership). If you are interested in being one of the testers, please email us as <u>info@fbwevillage.org</u>.

You'll hear more about Helpful Village over the coming weeks. We will have some online orientation sessions to introduce it to the membership. Additionally, volunteers will also be available to provide one-on-one coaching for folks who need it. We're very excited about this change and hope you will be too.


NOTE: The entrance to USIP is on 23rd Street NW, on the west side of the street, just opposite the C Street NW entrance to the State Department.



DC Grandparents Against COVID-19


The threat of COVID-19 isn't over, and we know that being up-to-date on vaccinations is the best strategy we have to protect ourselves and our community. DC Grandparents Against COVID-19 is a new local movement among adults aged 60 and older united in encouraging loved ones of all ages to get vaccinated and boosted. "Loved ones" is defined broadly to include family, friends and neighbors. You don't need to be a grandparent to join. You just need to commit to encouraging four or more people to get vaccinated or boosted – and even one conversation can mean a life saved. DC Grandparents Against COVID-19 has developed resources to help participants increase their knowledge and skills so they can initiate the conversations and respond to the false information that's interfering with vaccination rates.

There will be a virtual information session on May 25 at 3 pm for anyone 60 and over who would like to learn more about this effort to make a difference in the health and well-being of our community. Tuesday, May 3rd at 11:00 AM


In the wake of the chaotic U.S. withdrawal from Afghanistan, many believed America could never lead again. Putin's brutal invasion of Ukraine demonstrated that the US could not only lead but inspire and encourage others to do so, too. Yet the road ahead for US leadership in the world is strewn with major challenges, including a dysfunctional and fiercely polarized political system at home and the emergence of powers large and small that challenge U.S. influence and threaten its interests abroad. For America, it's a world to be smartly managed if possible, surely one not to be transformed.
