DISCUSSION AND TOUR OF THE COMPANION EXHIBITS "EMMETT TILL AND MAMIE TILL-MOBLEY: LET THE WORLD SEE" AND "MOTHERS OF THE MOVEMENT" Tuesday, March 7th, at 2:00 PM MLK Library, 901 G St NW, Washington, DC 20001

Emmett Till, who was Black, was visiting family in Mississippi when he was kidnapped, beaten, and killed by white men who accused the 14-year-old of whistling at a white woman. When the perpetrators tried to cover it up, Emmett's mother, Mamie, insisted that there be an open casket funeral and said "let the world see what they did to my boy." The killing of Till in the Mississippi Delta became a catalyst for the Civil Rights Movement.

The Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Library is sponsoring a traveling exhibit titled "Emmett Till and Mamie Till-Mobley: Let the World See" which tells the story of Emmett Till and his mother in the context of the larger Civil Rights Movement as well as an exhibit, Mothers of the Movement, which highlights women in our region who lost their children to violence and raises the awareness of this ongoing issue.

Susan Haight, a Founding Member of the FBWE Village, Co-President of the DC Public Library Foundation, and an active docent, will provide background on the exhibit and outline why this case is relevant today. Lorna Grenadier, also a Founding Member of the FBWE Village, will provide background on civil rights racial violence prosecutions and why the Till case is still being litigated. Lorna spent 35 years at the U.S. Department of Justice enforcing civil rights laws involving hate crimes and police misconduct.

The introductions and ensuing discussions will be followed by selfguided tours of these well-documented incidents.

Attendees will meet in Marianne's café of the Great Hall on the first floor of the library.

The Museum opened in 2002 in the Penn Quarter neighborhood of Washington, DC, and relocated to a new, expanded building with all-new exhibitions at L'Enfant Plaza in 2019.

Every nation considers intelligence essential to its national security. The Museum lifts the veil of secrecy on the hidden world of intelligence, exploring its successes and failures, challenges, and controversies.

Governor Ron DeSantis has rejected the College Board's Advanced Placement course in African American Studies for all of Florida's public high schools. At least 18 states have laws or policies that restrict the teaching of race. Is this a threat to freedom of speech? Is it censorship? Is racism systemic in America or is it a matter of individual prejudice?

Florida is one of 12 states that mandate Black History in public schools. Is Black History American History? Would we need a separate course in Black History if we included it in American History classes? Should paying attention to Black history be limited to one 28-day month? What are the political aspects of this controversy? Is this debate evidence of our atrophying democratic culture?

National Slam the Scam Day March 9, 2023

On National Slam the Scam Day and throughout the year, we give you the tools to recognize Social Security-related scams and stop scammers from stealing your money and personal information.

Share scam information with your loved ones. Slam the Scam!



Recognize the four basic signs of a scam:

- 1. Scammers pretend to be from a familiar organization or agency, like the Social Security Administration. They may email attachments with official-looking logos, seals, signatures, or pictures of employee credentials.
- 2. Scammers mention a problem or a prize. They may say your Social Security number was involved in a crime or ask for personal information to process a benefit increase.
- 3. Scammers pressure you to act immediately. They may threaten you with arrest or legal action.
- 4. Scammers tell you to pay using a gift card, prepaid debit card, cryptocurrency, wire or money transfer, or by mailing cash. They may also tell you to transfer your money to a "safe" account.

Ignore scammers and report criminal behavior. Report Social Security-related scams to the SSA Office of the Inspector General (OIG). Click here to make a report.

Tax returns will be filed electronically by the volunteers. Please note that persons with complicated tax documents (e.g. reporting rental income, self-employment income, investment income) cannot be served.



MICHAEL SMITH, MSW

Michael Smith served as his wife's caregiver after she was diagnosed with early onset dementia at age 54. He attended a few Alzheimer's education and support group programs during his wife's decline and became familiar with the services and resources available through the Alzheimer's Association. In 2014, Mr. Smith co-led a team with his daughter-in-law for the local Washington DC Walk To End Alzheimer's" event where they gathered a team of 10 walkers and raised close to \$10,000. In 2017, his wife Bernita passed away from complications of Alzheimer's. Upon his retirement last year, he wanted to give back by volunteering as a community educator and Support Group facilitator for the Alzheimer's Association National Capitol Area.

Mr. Smith received his undergraduate degree in Psychology from Georgetown University in 1978 and his master's degree in Social Work from Howard University in 1981.



The Aftermath: The End of the Baby Boom's Effect on Politics and the Economy Tuesday, March 14th, at 11:00 AM

Washington Post columnist Philip Bump's book, The Aftermath: The Last Days of the Baby Boon and the Future of Power in America, is a sweeping assessment of how the baby boom created modern America, and where power, wealth, and politics will shift as the boom ends. How much longer will Boomers control wealth? Will millennials get shortchanged for jobs and capital as Gen Z rises? What kind of pressure will Boomers exert on the health care system? How do generations and parties overlap? When will regional identity trump age or ethnic or racial identity? Who will the future GOP voter be, and how does that affect

Democratic strategies? What does the Census get right — and wrong?

Writing with a light hand and deft humor, Bump helps us navigate the flood of data in which our sense of the country now drowns. He fits numbers into a narrative about who we are (including what "we" really means), how we vote, where we live, what we buy—and what predictions we can make with any confidence. We know what will happen eventually to the baby boomers. What we don't know is how the boomer legacies might reshape the country one final time. Mr. Bump will share with us some answers that will help us manage the historic disruption of the American state we are now experiencing.
